Lessons and Applications:

1. Worship shapes everything

2. Worship of the One True God frees us to settle our quarrels

3. Worship of the One True God frees us to make decisions based on more than what we can see

The Bible talks about God's will in two ways:

- 1. God's will of decree (Ephesians 1:11)
- 2. God's will of desire

Quote: "What does God want me to do with my life? What job should I take? Where should I live? Those are the questions we ask when seek God's will of direction. We want to know his individual, specific plan for the who, what, where, when, and how of our lives. We want to know his direction...[this is] a secret will of direction that He expects us to figure out before we do anything."

Making Biblical Decisions:

- 1. What do you want to do? Know your own desires well.
- 2. Then ask: Do God's commands allow me to do what I want to do? Is there a command that speaks to this?
- 3. Can I make this decision in faith? Will it make me more holy? Will it help me follow Jesus? Will it make me more like Jesus? Will it honor Jesus?
